A Welcome from Our Executive Director


Thank you for joining us this evening in a celebration of popular orchestral music!

Greetings From Our Music Director

No Theme. What!...A Pops concert with *no theme*?! No "Evening with Johnny Mathis" or "A James Bond Extravaganza"? How about a "Soap Opera themes from the Sixties and Seventies"? You got it.

I once heard a very famous Pops conductor describe his idea of what Pops music is. He used a modern day record store as his metaphor. He remarked how in a record store one can go to the rock & roll or classical section, take a gander through the jazz bin, the shelves of broadway music or the selection of different movie soundtracks. But what was special about Pops, he explained, is that the genre is not confined to its own section --it draws from each and every section in that record store. The Pops repetoire truly has something for everyone. And that's what I've tried to include tonight---something for everyone.

Whether your taste lies on the Broadway stage, with great movie, classical, or rock & roll music, you're in for a treat tonight. Bernard Herrmann's collaboration with the master of suspense, Alfred Hitchcock, has remained one of the best composer/director relationships ever. Vertigo and North by Northwest are two of Herrman's greatest scores. Along with the release of *The Sting* in the mid-seventies came a resurgence of interest in the music of Scott Joplin, the great ragtime composer and pianist. We're happy to share a delightful arrangement of tunes from that movie. The music of Rodgers & Hammerstein has continued to stand the test of time. We present four songs tonight from South Pacific and The King and I. We also present two works from the classical stage -- Faure's celebrated Pavane and the Vocalise of Sergei Rachmaninoff. Both of these works have the ability to reach listeners in a way other pieces can not. And of course, when it comes to great rock & roll bands, you'll be sure to find the Beatles at the top of most anyone's list. We close with a salute to the music of John Lennon and Paul McCartney.

So, there you have it. No Theme...just great music. I suppose that in itself *is* a theme. Well, sort of at least...

He currently studies saxophone with Donald Sinta and opeartic conducting with Martin Katz. With aid from a Power Grant from the School of Music, Steven traveled to Czech Republic this past summer to study orchestral conducting. Currently, Steven is involved with the UMS Choral Union as an Assistant Conductor under Thomas Sheets.

Steven, a native of Cincinnati, OH, came to Michigan for the sole reason of studying with Donald Sinta. Steven would like to express his sincerest respect and warmest gratitude towards Professor Sinta for his guidance in music and in life. His performance tonight will be most treasured.

Making his conducting debut this evening, John Rutherford transferred to the University of Michigan after two years of study at the New England Conserva tory of Music in Boston, Massachusettes. Pursuing a Bachelor of Music in Trombone Performance, he is currently studying with Professor H. Dennis Smith. He has also studied with Norman Bolter, Randall Hawes, and Ronald Kischuk. This past summer, Mr. Rutherford was a fellowship recipient to the Norfolk Chamber Music Festival, which is the summer home of the Yale

School of Music. This December, he will spend three weeks touring Israel with the Shira International Symphony Orchestra. In addition, he has appeared as soloist with the Grosse Pointe Symphony Orchestra on two occasions, performed with the University of Michigan Symphony Orchestra, the New England Conservatory Philharmonia, the Kalamazoo Symphony Orchestra, the Birmingham-Bloomfield Symphony Orchestra, the Boston Chamber Ensemble, and the Cape Cod Ballet Orchestra.







Donald Sinta, Professor of Saxophone and chair of the Winds and Percussion Department, joined the faculty in 1974. Formerly on the faculties of the Hartt School of Music and Ithaca College, he is active as soloist and clinician throughout the United States and Canada. His recording American Music for the Saxophone is known throughout the world.

Mr. Sinta has premiered more than 40 works by American composers, and in 1969 he was the first elected chair of the World Saxophone Congress. He is director of the All-

State Program at Interlochen and the Michigan Youth Ensembles Program. Mr. Sinta was named Arthur F. Thurnau Professor for distinguished undergraduate teaching in 1991.

HOW TO BECOME A MEMBER OF THE MICHIGAN POPS ORCHESTRA


