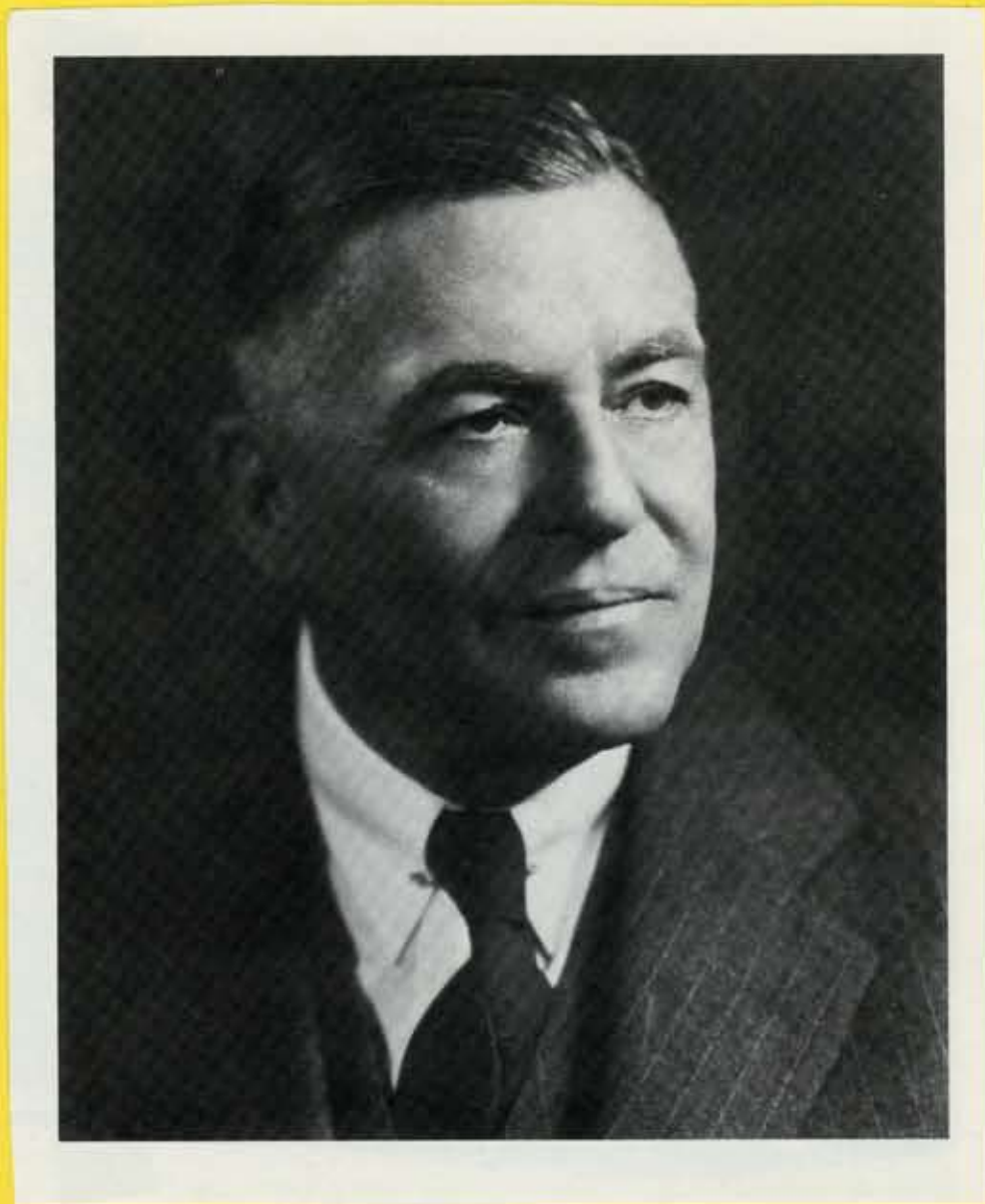

University Lecturer To Direct Program For Council Of Defense

Appointment of Mrs. Martha G. Sawyer, of Ann Arbor, wife of Prof. Ralph A. Sawyer, as chief of the consumer activities division of the State Council of Defense was announced in Lansing today by Lt-Col. Harold A. Furlong, administrator.

Mrs. Sawyer was loaned to the council by the University of Michigan, where she has been a lecturer in the School of Business Administration for the past three years. For nine years previously she was assistant to the dean. Mrs. Sawyer's services were made available to the state by Dr. Alexander G. Ruthven, University president.

Her husband, a lieutenant commander in the United States Navy, is assigned to the naval proving ground at Dahlgren, Va., in charge of the armor and projectile laboratory. In peacetime, Lt.-Com. Sawyer was a professor of physics at the University.

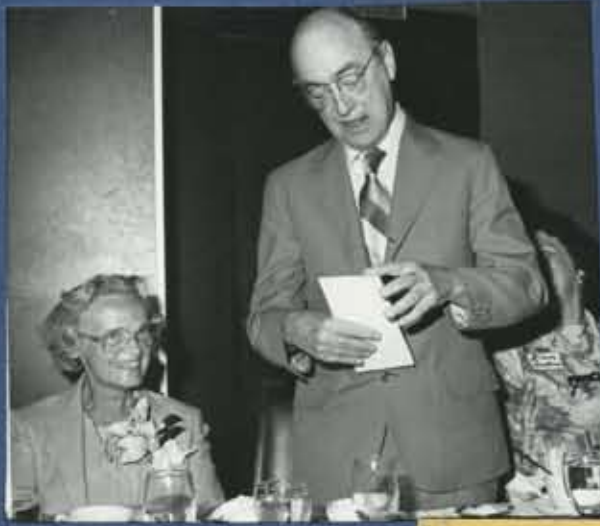

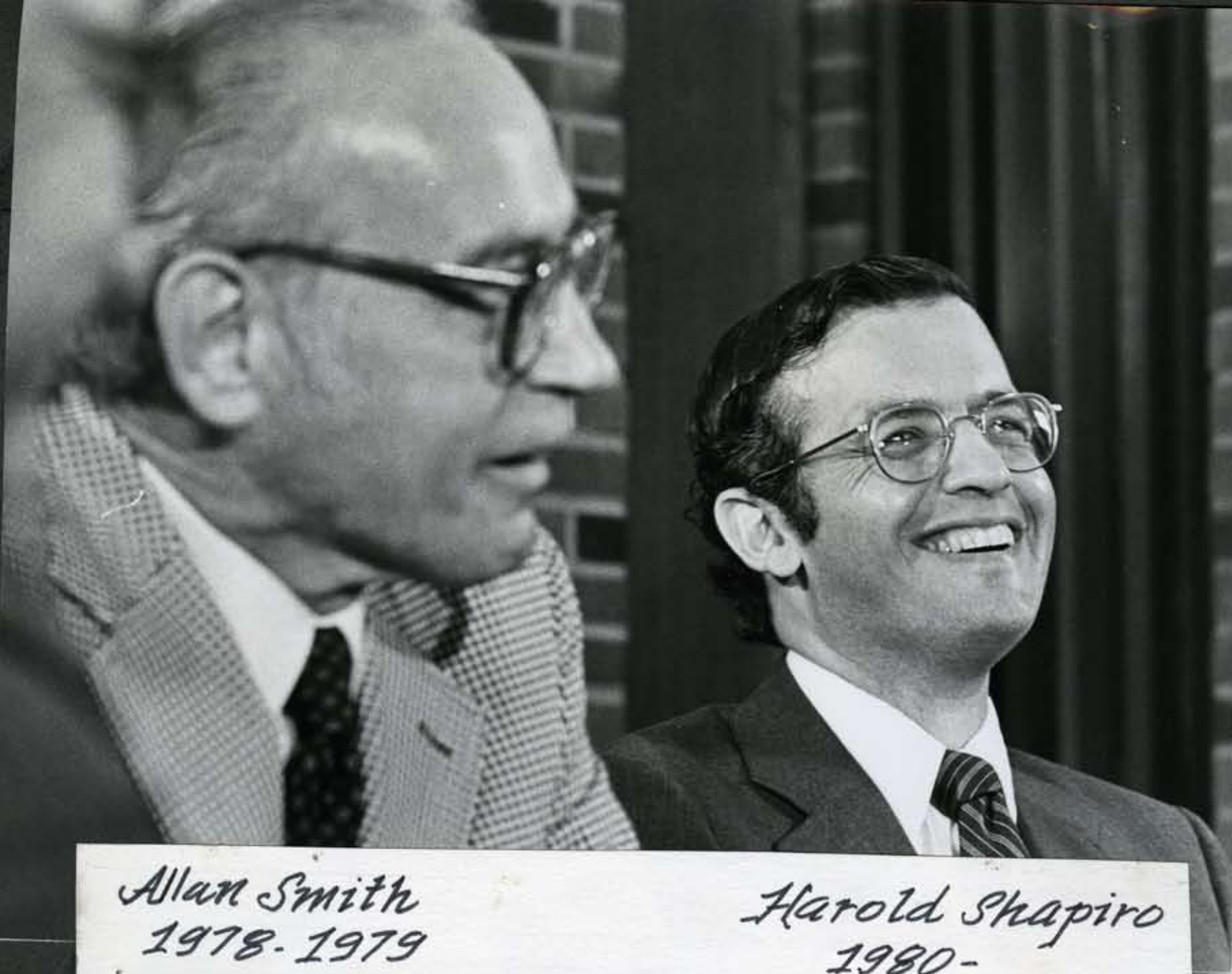

**HAPPY 60th ANNIVERSARY TO THE
FACULTY WOMEN'S CLUB**

Sixty years ago, on October 26, 1921, a beautiful fall day, Mrs. Marion LeRoy Burton, wife of the then president of the University of Michigan, gathered together fifty women - wives of deans, administrative officers, department heads and professors - to consider forming a Faculty Women's Club similar to one functioning at the University of Minnesota. On that auspicious October day, the Faculty Women's Club of the University of Michigan was born in the president's home at 815 South University. Then as now the purpose of the Club was to promote acquaintance and friendship among its members.

Mrs. Burton was elected the first president and served for four years, the longest term of any president. Since 1921, there have been 44 presidents, most of whom have served two-year terms, but in 1959 the term of the president was changed to one year, with a previous year as president-elect.

What can you say about 60 years of club activities? The answer is "It takes a stack of tea cups for 60 years of talk!"

A quick look back over the years shows a few changes - dues were \$1 in 1921, \$5 in 1981; three interest sections were formed in the first few months, 67 exist in 1981; and the original group of 50 members is over 1,000 today, having reached a peak of 1,638 paid members in the year 1968-69. The activity within the sections stretches from Art to Yoga currently. Think of the fun these women have enjoyed over six decades hiking, painting, acting, cooking, reading-and-reviewing, bridging, antiquing, touring, investing, dancing, golfing, tennis, hostessing, teeing, and laughing with friends.

The FWC was designed so that wives and women faculty members could get acquainted and share similar interests, and make close friends in the small groups. Each section from the beginning has permitted a limited number of guest members from the community creating a Town and Gown atmosphere.

The Newcomers Section has been one of the most important groups since 1926. New wives and women faculty are warmly greeted by resident wives who are available to provide information about the University and living in the Ann Arbor area. Information Please by faculty wives can help new arrivals with doctor, lawyer, merchant and schools. This friendly approach in early September makes Newcomers feel welcome as they settle into the Ann Arbor area.

At the other end of the spectrum from Newcomers, there is a Longtimers group which is of more recent origin and consists of members who have been active for many years in the FWC. The Golden Members are very "special" since their group includes women who have belonged to the club for 50 years.

Over the years the minutes of the FWC bring up the problem of "Where will the club meet? Where will the sections meet?" It is an on-going discussion and the reason the sections are often limited in size is to accommodate them to meeting in homes. In the early years, the University provided a red brick house on South Ingalls where Burton Tower now sends forth its carillon music. However, when the Michigan League was completed in the spring of 1929, the FWC shortly moved its activities to the League rooms. Even today most of the main events are held in the League, but the meetings of the Board of Directors of the club are held monthly at Inglis House.

The Faculty Women's Club progressed through the twinkling twenties and then met the challenge of the depression years of the 1930's by seeing membership rise to 468 in 1940. Then World War II emptied the Campus for five years, but following 1945 the G.I. Bill of Rights brought veterans to the campus. A brief statistic to show this: In 1945 there were 11,800 students at the University while one year later, there were 19,000 students. How the University grew - more students, more professors, more exciting courses and more buildings! And the FWC was nearing 1,000 in membership by 1950.

There was a surge of interest in "theater" as the club's wives and husbands joined to produce "Cabaret Extraordinaire". Then came three years of Faculty Follies - 1951, 1952, 1953 - and an Anniversary Skit in 1961 "40 Years in Song and Rhyme." There was a mood for parties and the FWC and the Men's University Club joined for Holiday Teas several years in the men's club library at the Michigan Union. What a switch these teas were: the men wearing boutonnieres served at the tea tables pouring tea and passing cakes! The last joint FWC - University Club party was a welcome to the Flemings when they came to the Campus in February of 1968. Those were great years and many a professor and administrator trod the boards.

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Faculty-Alumni Dances were sponsored by the Faculty Women's Club for many, many years and both Town and gown turned out to "trip the light fantastic". The bands were exceptionally good and the candlelit Michigan Union ballroom added magic to the gathering of happy couples. There were small parties all over Ann Arbor prior to the drop of the baton at 9 p.m. Not until the mid 1970's did enthusiasm for the dances wane.

At the time of the FWC Golden Anniversary, celebrated at the Annual Spring Luncheon in 1972, the club received "A RESOLUTION HONORING THE UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN FACULTY WOMEN'S CLUB" from the House of Representatives of the State of Michigan, which ends with this RESOLVE:

"That the University of Michigan Faculty Women's Club by accorded unanimous tribute by the Michigan House of Representatives in recognition of its half a century of promoting fellowship among faculty women and wives of faculty members, and further join in wishing the members of the University of Michigan Faculty Women's Club continued growth and accomplishment as they celebrate their Golden Anniversary. (Adopted by the House April 11, 1972.)

The years often bring delightful surprises! In 1977, former President Gerald Ford was here on Campus giving courses and the Faculty Women's Club had the privilege of asking his wife, Betty Ford, to become an honorary member. She accepted and was asked to be guest of honor at the April Annual Luncheon. The chairman of the luncheon had difficulty keeping up with reservations. However, at the last minute, Betty couldn't make it. Appointment reignited until the silver lining department pointed out that our club treasury benefited NORMOUSLY: You have to be a paid member of the club to make a luncheon reservation!

The Faculty Women's Club in 1974 was delighted when asked to join the Senate Advisory Committee on University Affairs (SACUA) as co-hosts of The State of the University Address and Reception. Husband and wife teams help seat the audience for the meetings and ladle punch following the reception.

In recent years the Faculty Women's Club has sponsored four main gatherings a year: the fall membership tea when sometimes as many as 700 women come to greet friends and join sections; a reception before the holiday break, a mid-winter dinner-dance, and the annual spring luncheon.

The 60th Anniversary of the club was celebrated at the April 1981 Annual Luncheon. Six models representing the decades from 1920 to 1980 brought back the styles of these years. Historic memorabilia of the 60 years were displayed on 12 large panels in the Vandenberg Room of the League. Featured were pictures of various club events through the years; past FWC presidents and University presidents; the President's House - birthplace of the club in 1921; U-M families of the past and assorted news articles about FWC events. April 15, 1981 was a very special day with wonderful celebration to which twenty-one past presidents of FWC came.

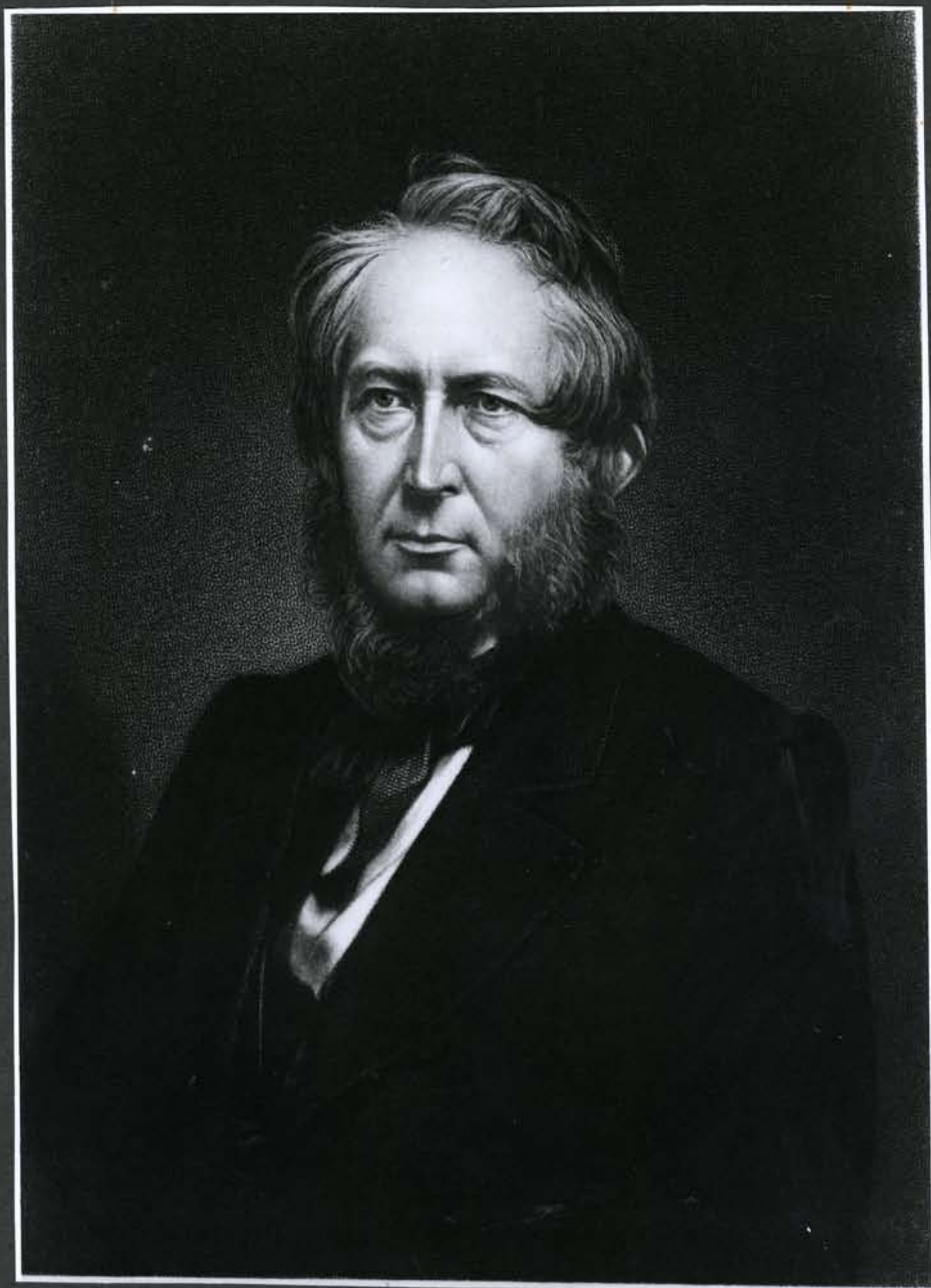

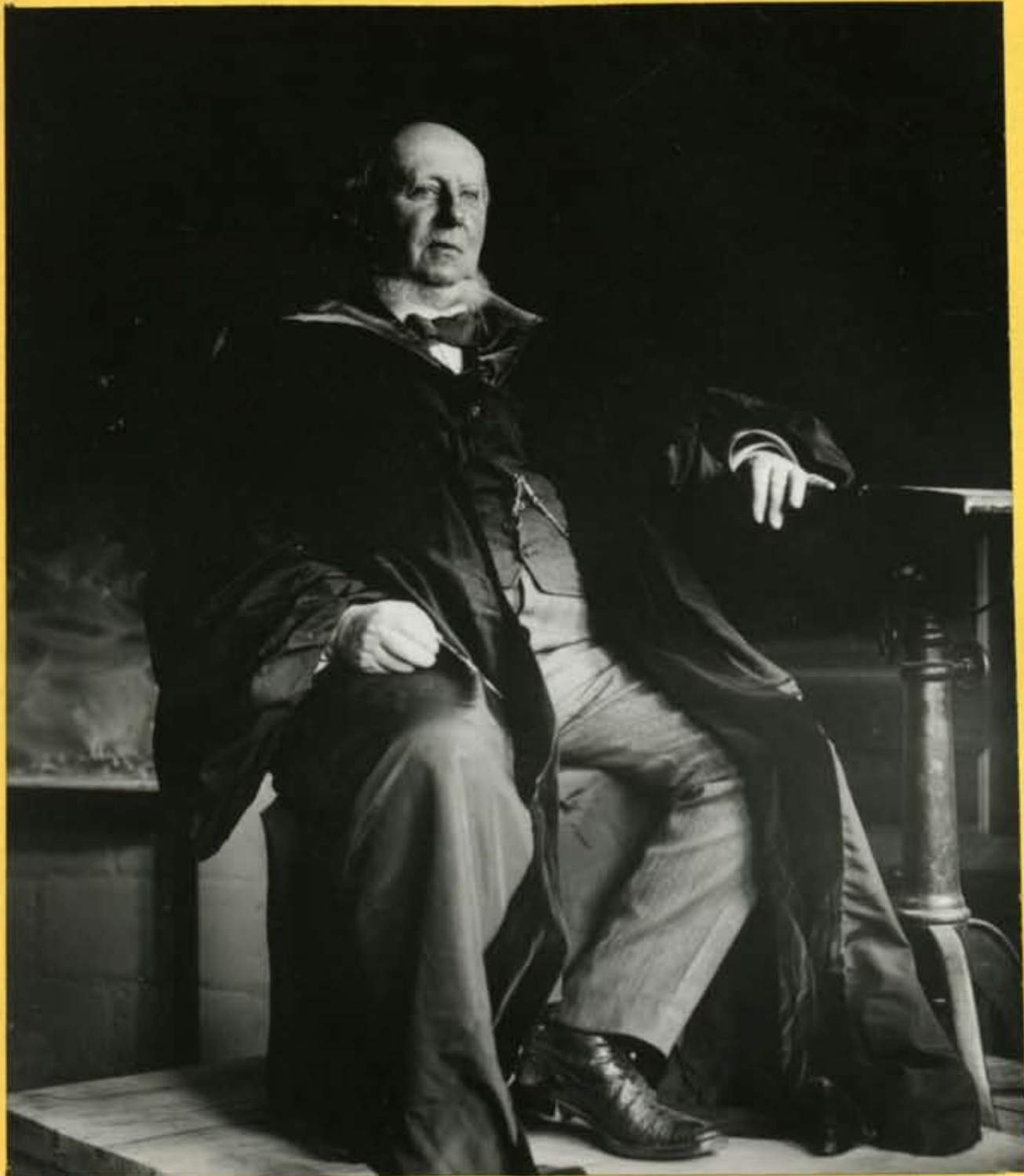

before October 26, 1921



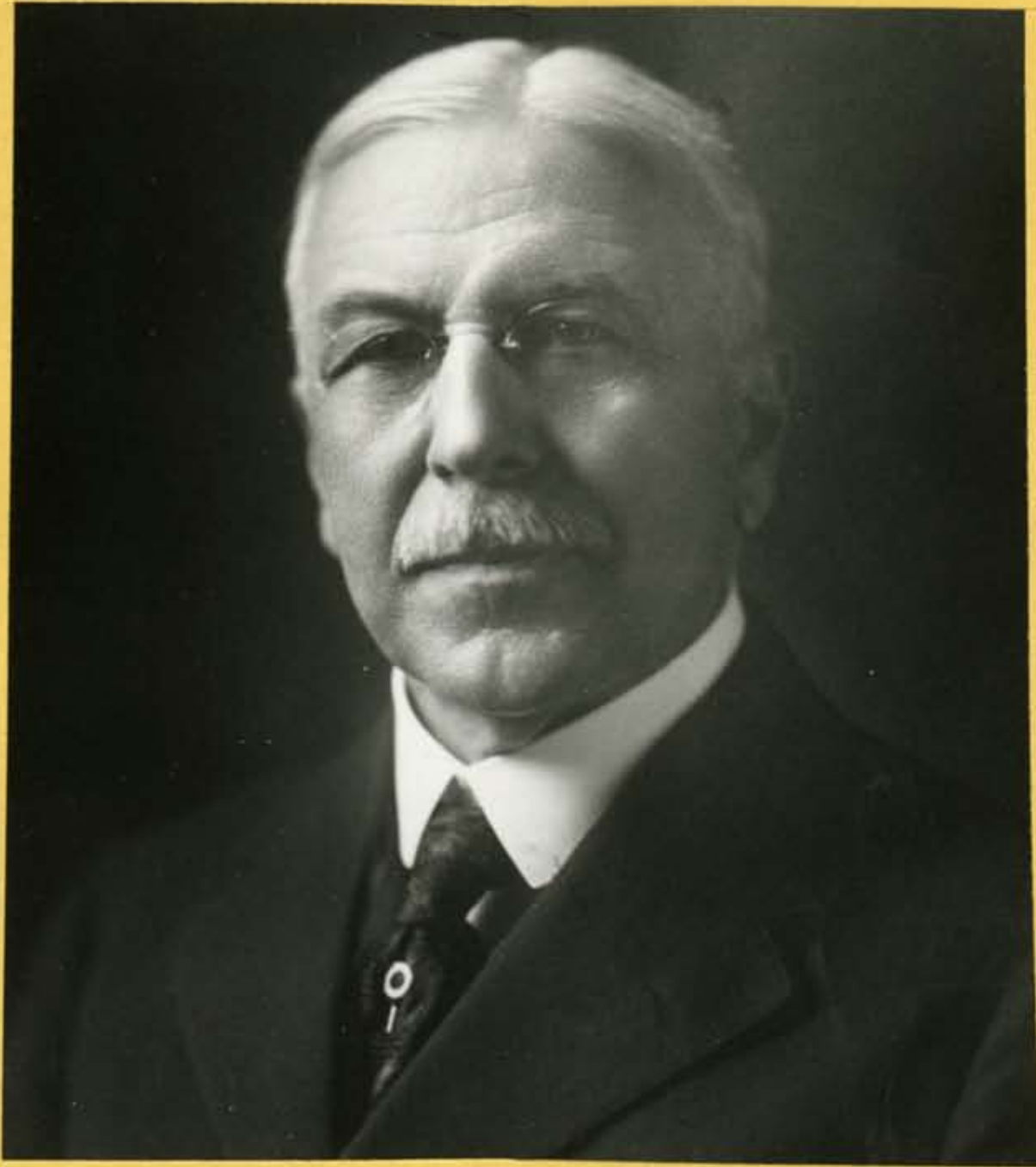

Faculty Women's Club to mark its 60th anniversary in April

The Faculty Women's Club at the University of Michigan will celebrate its 60th anniversary at the annual spring luncheon, Wednesday, April 15, at the Michigan League with Mrs. William Castor presiding.

An exhibit of memorabilia including an array of pictures of people and events of the past 60 years will be displayed in the Vandenberg Room.

In addition, members will view a fashion review representing the six decades from 1921 to 1981. The decade models are Mrs. Harlan Hatcher, Mrs. Thomas Roach, Mrs. Gary Moeller, Mrs. Richard G. Parker, Mrs. William S. Vorus and Mrs. John Gronvall, with Mrs. L. Hart Wright as commentator and Mrs. John Carow at piano. Mrs. Wright will also read a brief poem in honor of the FWC's 60th anniversary written by Harlan and Hope Bloomer.

Mrs. Marion LeRoy Burton, wife of the then U-M president, had been in Ann Arbor just over a year when she decided that a faculty women's club similar to one in Minnesota might be considered. On Oct. 26, 1921, 50 women — wives of deans, administrative officers, department heads and professors, met with Mrs. Burton; and the Faculty Women's Club was born in the president's home on South University.

Mrs. Burton was elected the first president and served for four years, the longest term of any president. Since 1921, there have been 42 presidents, 20 of them serving two-year terms. Since 1959 the term has been one year, with a training year as president-elect.

A quick look back over the years shows a few changes — dues were \$1 in 1921, \$5 in 1981; three interest groups were formed early in 1922, 67 exist in 1981; and the original group of 50 members has grown to over 1,000.

From the beginning, groups of women sharing the same interests have met in small sections and made friends. Groups for art, book review, drama and garden have large memberships. Some play bridge. Others gather to discuss ideas for the home. There are others who enjoy sports: badminton, hiking, golf, swimming, and tennis.

The Newcomers Section has been one of the most important groups since 1926. New wives are warmly greeted and resident wives are available to give them information about Ann Arbor and the U-M. This friendly approach helps new wives to enjoy their new location. At the other end of the spectrum from Newcomers, there is a Longtimers group which is of more recent origin and consists of wives who have been active for many years in the FWC. Any 10 FWC members can start a new section.

At various times over the 60 years, the Faculty Women's Club has produced skits with husbands and wives participating. For a few years these evenings were called Faculty Fun Nite and professors and administrators trod the boards.

Recent years find the FWC sponsoring four main gatherings a year: the fall Membership Tea, a Friendship Tea at the president's house before the holiday break, a mid-winter dinner-dance and the annual spring luncheon.

Twenty past presidents of the Faculty Women's Club expect to attend the 60th Anniversary Gala. Mrs. Merwin H. Waterman will attend. Other special guests will include Mrs. Harold Shapiro, Mrs. Robben Fleming, Mrs. Hatcher and Mrs. Zelma Weisfeld.

Mrs. J. Philip Wernette is chairman of the historical research for the 60th anniversary, assisted by Mrs. H. R. Crane and Mrs. Burton Baker.

20's (Joan Gronvall)

(MUSIC UNDER: SIDE BY SIDE)

The 20's may have been roaring - but not our club! Joan Gronvall shows us what we might have worn to the FWC's very first gathering - on October 26th, 1921. (MUSIC UP BRIEFLY).

By 1926, there was even a Newcomers' Section. And Choral Union was underway.

What else can we recall? There was prohibition - and gangsters, and molls. But there was also Lindberg, and Dempsey and Tunney; Helen Wills Moody and Bill Tilden; Babe Ruth and 60 home runs; the Four Horsemen of Notre Dame; and the Wolverines' masterful pair - Freedman and Oosterbaan! Such sports' fever sparked the building of our stadium - seating 72,000!

Burton and ^{Little} Cook led our University; Harding, Coolidge and Hoover, the nation.

The stock market ^{crashed} crashed on Black Friday, October 29, 1929. But Ann Arbor's spirits were lifted with the completion of this very same Michigan League, one of the biggest alumni projects to that date. (Music UP)

30's (Anne Hatcher)

MUSIC: STARDUST)

Anne Hatcher reminds us that the 30's retained elegance and style, despite that decade's dismal beginning. (MUSIC UP).

One of the University's pioneer women professors in the 30's was Margaret Tracy - who adorned the Bus. Ad. School. Anne Hatcher is wearing a dress that was in Margaret Tracy's trousseau for her honeymoon in Paris with her law-professor groom. Many of us remember Margaret fondly. She was as loyal to our club as Anne Hatcher has always been.

President and Mrs. Ruthven resided at 815 S. University. FDR came on the national scene - with Fireside Chats and Eleanor and a new model for First Ladies.

Banks closed - but prohibition was repealed. Hitler's invasion of Poland in September, 1939, sent a shudder 'round the world. (MUSIC UP)

40's (Julie Vorus)

(MUSIC: PAPER DOLL)

Julie Vorus, in this black and gold lame gown, could be the epitome of the GI's pin-up girl of the 40's. (MUSIC UP)

From Pearl Harbor to the Battle of the Bulge, World War II was fought on many fronts...while the University trained Japanese language experts and judge advocates for the military, and shrank...but held on to its excellence.

There was the Bomb and Hiroshima and finally - VE and VJ Days - and Harry Truman in the White House.

Along with the flood of GI-Bill students and lots of new faculty, the University enjoyed prosperity and Fritz Kreisler's great 49-0 Rosebowl Victory. (MUSIC UP)

50's

(Anne Moeller)

(MUSIC: YOU COULD HAVE DANCED ALL NIGHT)

Anne Moeller brings us into the 50's wearing a Ceil Chap an original. Can't you see Mamie Eisenhower wearing it? (MUSIC UP)

Ike was inaugurated as U.S. President shortly after we inaugurated Harlan Hatcher as ours. The 50's brought an armistice in Korea and Joe McCarthy. Old Haven Hall went up in smoke. The Pill arrived. G. Mennen Williams was a 6-term governor. Tommy Francis and the Salk Vaccine gave us cause to celebrate. The Flint University Branch opened. Revolt in Hungary flared and died. *Brown v. Board of Education* decreed that our education system ~~had to be non-discriminatory.~~ *must not be racially segregated.*

There was so much to love in the 50's - "My Fair Lady" - and acquisition of the beautiful rolling hills of North Campus. Academia in its heyday!!

60's

(Sally Roach)

(MUSIC: HELLO DOLLY!)

C'mon, Sally Roach - remind us that we did wear and flaunt our mini-skirts in the 60's. (MUSIC UP)

Our spirits were as up and down as our minis and maxis in this decade.

We had Kennedy and the Peace Corps' birth on the Michigan Union's steps. Then Camelot - and assassinations. Martin Luther King, and "We Shall Overcome." There was LEJ and Ladybird - and the announcement of the Great Society at President Johnson's commencement address at our stadium. We had two astronauts - McDevitt and White.

The Dearborn Center opened - as did the Matthai Botanical Gardens.

Robben W. Fleming became President of the University just in time to deal with SDS - the Viet Nam Protests - the Black Action Movement; and the Club gained another loyal supporter in Sally. The U's sesqui-centennial was a huge success.

Eero Saarinen's vision of the Music School became a reality. Nixon made it to the White House. We had 1,638 members - the highest ever - in ^{year} 1968-1969.

And the 60's ended with an event which thrilled the world - Man's First Giant Step on the Moon. (MUSIC UP)

70's

(Monica Parker)

(MUSIC: RAINDROPS KEEP FALLING)

Monica Parker ushers in the 70's. Have they really come and gone? (MUSIC) There was the Cold War - and Kissinger. China invited the world in again. Stunning Power Center had a star-studded opening.

There was Watergate - and then Michigan's own Gerald Ford assumed the Presidency. Do you remember, in 1976, when Betty Ford was to be a guest of honor at this occasion? We had a real run on reservations. Betty couldn't make it at the last minute - but our treasury benefitted--ENORMOUSLY! The Carters followed the Fords.

At the beginning of the 70's Schembechler arrived - and at the end, Woody went. The decade ended with Allan Smith as Interim President. A new decade begins with a young Shapiro to lead the University - a healthy Reagan in Washington - and a great new shuttle in space! (MUSIC UP)

So, here we are - 60 years mature. Let's back to Hope and Harlan's rhyme:

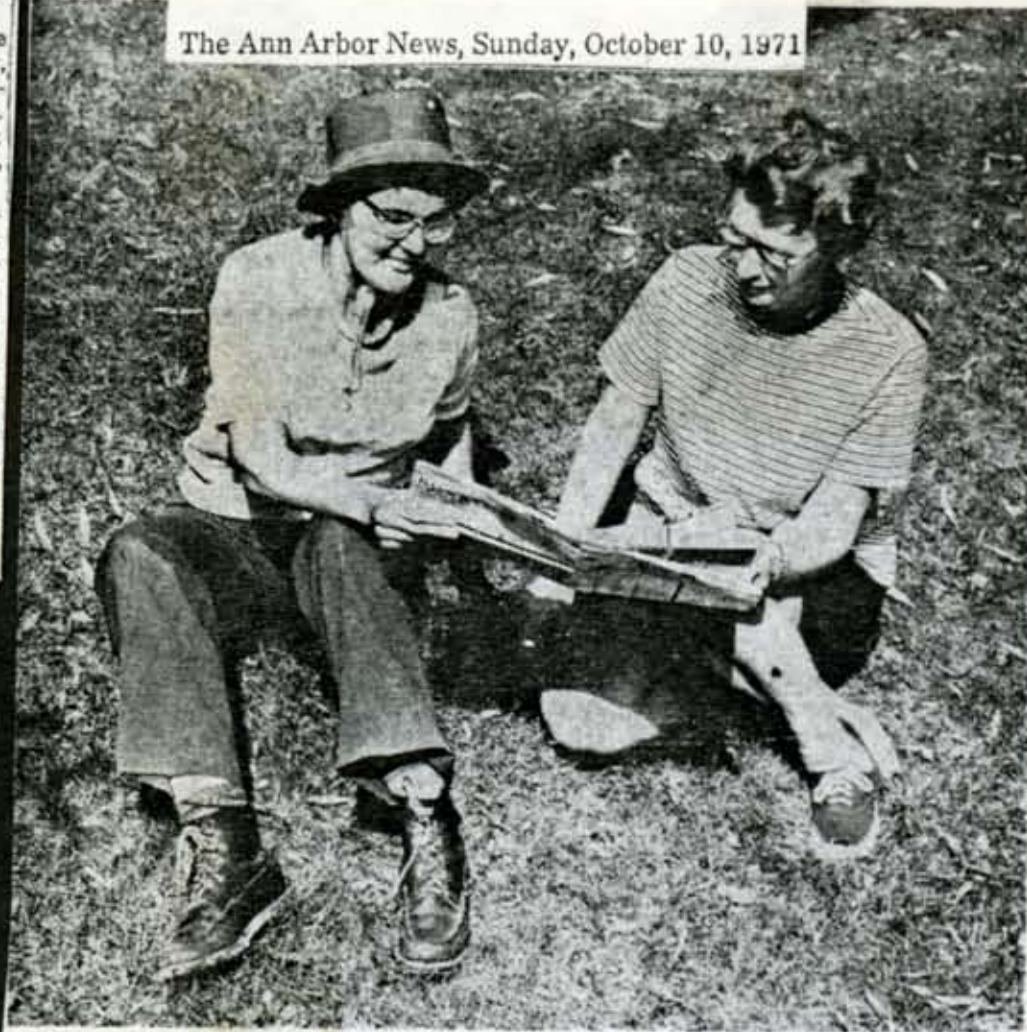

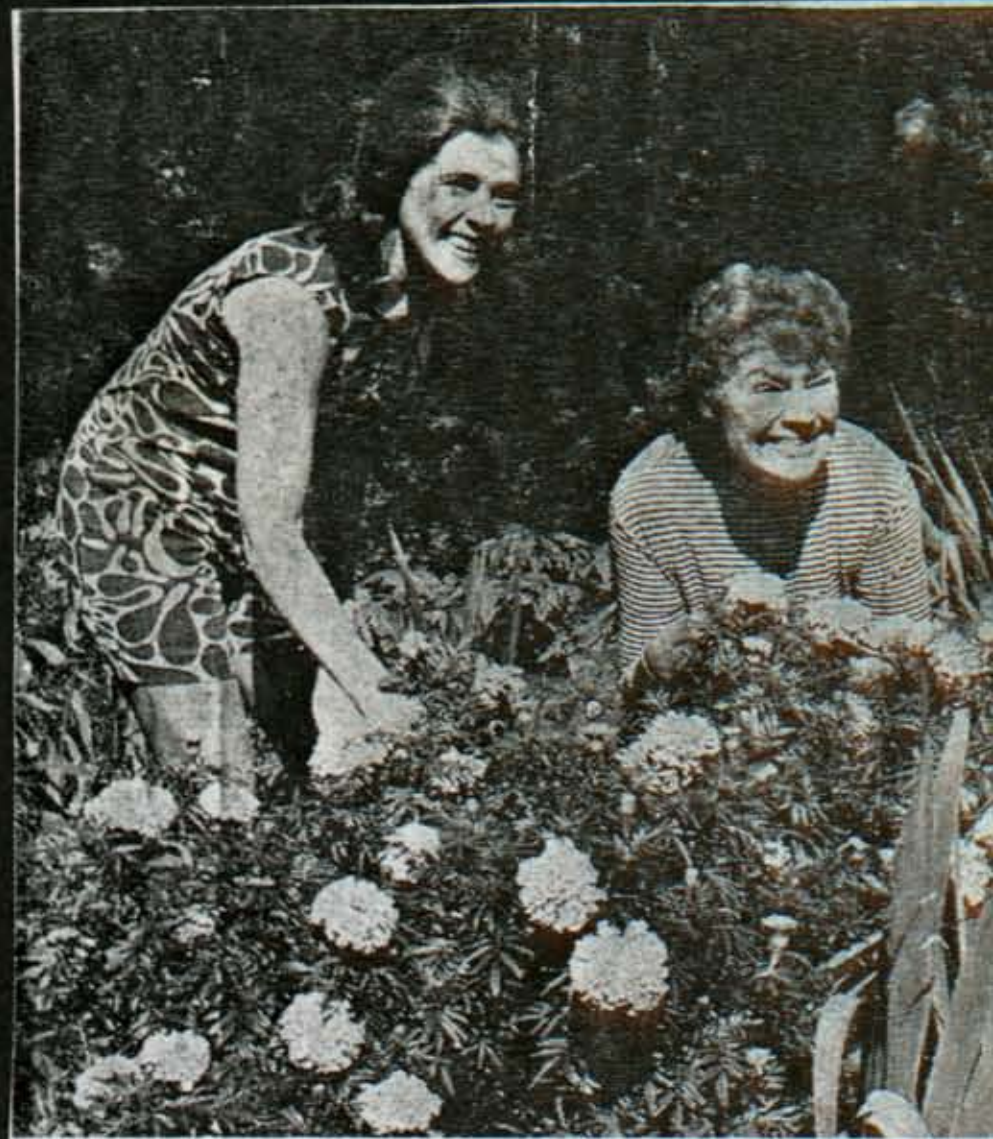

Not nearly enough. In fact, you can't really say anything; you have to be content to flip quickly through the years and catch a flavor, a glimpse.

Surely, Mrs. Marion L. Burton, wife of the University's president during the 1920s, would be surprised to see the U-M Faculty Women's Club as it is today. . . . She never would have believed that her little band of 50 women would grow into an organization 1,500-strong with 45 interest sections and dozens of activities.

The late Mrs. Burton, a strong-willed Minnesota native, arrived in Ann Arbor with her husband after he assumed the presidency of the University of Michigan. She decided that a faculty women's club similar to one at the University of Minnesota needed to be organized.

To that end, she gave a tea for wives, deans, administrative officers and heads of departments on Oct. 21, 1921, to discuss the advisability of establishing a faculty women's club.

Within two months, a group had been formed, a constitution written and accepted and officers installed with Mrs. Burton as president. (It is said that Mrs. Burton was not the sort of person to "let things grow under her feet.") She led the club until 1925, making her term the longest of any president since.

It's hard to think of our mothers and grandmothers as ecology freaks and liberationists, but that's exactly what they did like when you read accounts of early Faculty Women's Club activities.

For example, out of the initial four interest sections in the club during the 1920s, one was the Athletic Section (with tennis, horseback riding and riflery) and the other was called the Nursery Section.

It is interesting to note that the Hiking Section, which had died early in the club's history, just recently was revived as the Faculty Women's Club as a sort of return-to-nature experiment.

Even more amazing is the fact that the old Nursery Section of the 1920s created a cooperative day care center for benefit wives of students. Again, this has repeated itself in the '70s with a day care center on campus for — you guessed it — a cooperative day care center.

Child care programs definitely have changed since then, though. A 1923 newspaper clipping describes the old nursery program: "Constructive play is provided and a strict discipline whereby the tiny tots are given tasks to perform, as dusting, preparation of 'tea' (which consists of an Arrow-root biscuit at four o'clock) and putting away the things afterward."

In the 1930s, events continued at a normal pace. It was noted in a 1934 newspaper clipping that several newlywed couples would be welcomed into the domestic community that year.

Included in the list was "Prof. John E. Tracy of the law faculty, and Mrs. Tracy (Dr. Margaret Elliott), whose wedding was an event of last winter." Margaret Elliott Tracy was one of the early open faculty members at the U-M and a professor emerita of personnel management in the School of Business Administration.

During the years of World War II, the Faculty Women's Club saw some changes. In announcing plans for the

club's annual reception in the fall of 1942, one article notes:

"This (the reception) is one of the customs to be continued in a wartime year of many changes. The club itself has given up its chief social program for both the faculty men and their wives, the Faculty-Alumni dance series, which also brought together campus and town groups . . .

"The dance committee . . . has put the money remaining in its treasury club on \$85 War Bond. The club as a whole has to its credit a \$600 bond, and the Garden Section has bought a \$50 bond.

"In harmony with the policy of reducing club expenses, the customary invitations were omitted in sending the announcements of the reception and of the club's program . . .

It appears that the 1950s brought out the theatrical aspirations of club members and their husbands. They staged such extravaganzas as the "Cabaret Extraordinaire" (1950) complete with a juggling act and barbershop quartet; "Faculty Follies of 1951" highlighted by a hillbilly duet on the mandolin and ukulele; "Faculty Frolics" (1952); "Faculty Frolics of 1953" with a skit, "Kinsey Take It? or Why Did I Marry a Professor?"

Every women's lib would have loved to have been around in 1954 when "Faculty Frolics" uncovered "Men In a World of Women," a skit which poked fun at the "Woman In the World of Man" series of discussions and events that the U-M sponsored during the summer of '54. A photograph which appeared in The News publicizing "Frolics" that year pictured Vice President Allan F. Smith (then Prof. Smith) wearing an apron and contemplating KP duty.

In 1961, predictably, the Faculty Women's Club celebrated its 40th anniversary with a skit, "40 Years in Song and Rhyme."

The faculty women and their husbands looked ahead in 1964 with a musical skit exploring "The Faculty Club of the Future." And perhaps a repeat of the skit would be in order now that the club has marked its half-century anniversary.

Since 1921, the club's activities have continued without even so much as a pause for breath. The women have been hiking, skating, painting, acting, cooking, reading, hostessing, teaing, bridging, gardening and laughing their way through the years.

Now they have 50 years of memories to review and another 50 to plan. Anniversary congratulations, Faculty Women!



Follies' Frustrations

The 1950s marked the stage debuts of many a Faculty Women's Club member. An original floor show, "Faculty Follies of 1951," featured a skit called, "Faculty Frustrations" written by Mrs. Fred K. Sparrow Jr. The picture which appeared publicizing the "Follies" that year shows Mrs. L. Hart Wright, far right, as a frustrated faculty wife interrupted by a telephone call from Junior while getting ready

to attend an important meeting with her "husband," Allan F. Smith (then Prof. Smith and now Vice President Smith). Sympathetic onlookers in the photograph are Mrs. W. W. Chase, far left, and Mrs. Thomas A. Hunter, seated. Smith appeared a few years later in The News as a "househusband" in an apron — publicizing another Faculty Women's skit about "Men In a World of Women."

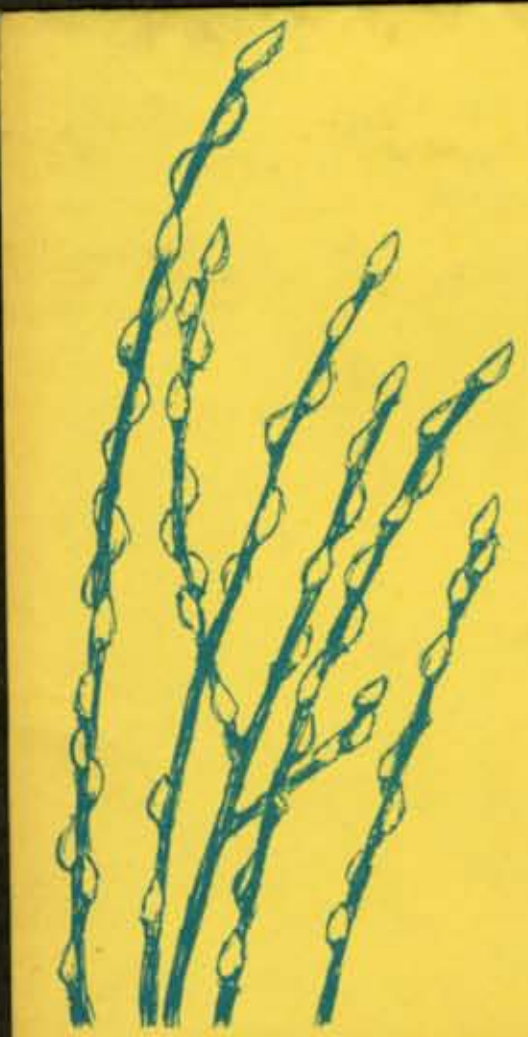

FACULTY WOMEN MEET FOR TEA Evolution of Contributions To Local Cultural Climate

The University of Michigan had been in existence more than a hundred years before a group of faculty women under the leadership of Nina Leona Burton, wife of University President Marion L. Burton, met at tea one day to organize for social activities in which they could share their common interests and talents.

On Oct. 26, 1921, the wives of deans, administrative officers and heads of departments met in the Burton home to begin the formal structure of the Club. Five women were delegated to draw up the constitution and for some months thereafter the women met weekly on Tuesday afternoon for tea and talk. This Tuesday afternoon group soon evolved into what was then and is still today the Tuesday Afternoon Playreading Group.

The Club was designed to provide a service to the University making it possible for wives and women faculty members to become acquainted and to share similar interests with one another. Care was taken to be helpful in welcoming newcomers to the University family. Each section permitted a limited number of guest members enabling other women in the community to join the groups.

In March of 1922 the Board of Directors authorized three interest sections—drama, day nursery and athletics. The following year the Club was offered the use of a red brick house at 226 South Ingalls when the Health Service moved to larger

quarters. The day nursery began its operation there, and in 1924 the Merrill-Palmer School began a branch in the club house under the auspices of the Day Nursery Section. This combined nursery program lasted for five years. At one time the Michigan Dames also used the house as a meeting place.

When the Michigan League was completed, the furnishings of the club house were sold and sometime after 1931 meetings were held in the League. The house was later demolished to make way for Burton Tower.

At present there are 63 interest groups in the Club, sharing their enthusiasm for music, drama, bridge, cookery, gardening, books, art, languages, flower arrangement, interior decorating, travel and sports. One of the special interest sections is the "Long-timers group which has several members who have been active in the FWC since its beginning. Membership has grown from 50 in the early years to 1,311 in 1973. Suggestions for new interest sections are always encouraged.

The talent and interest of FWC in music, art and theater have contributed to the cultural climate of Ann Arbor. During the first 25 years, the FWC often provided dramatic and musical entertainment for University and semi-public functions. Today most of this kind of fun is kept within the activities of the Club. FWC dances have been popular with faculty and townspeople since they began in 1927. A spring flower show was another yearly event in the early years.

The annual events of the FWC at the present time include the fall membership tea, a holiday gathering hosted by Mrs. Robben Fleming, a mid-winter faculty fun night, and the spring luncheon and business meeting.

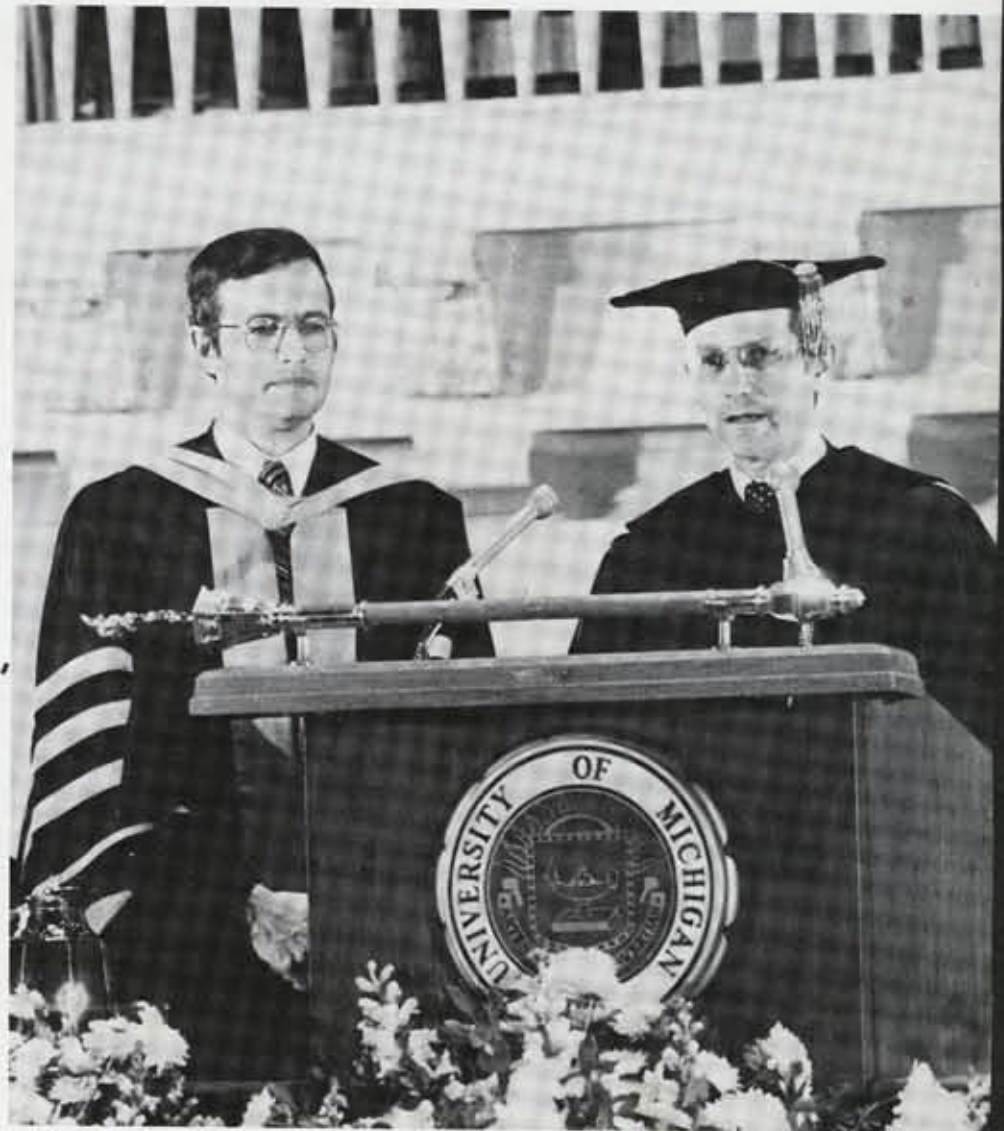

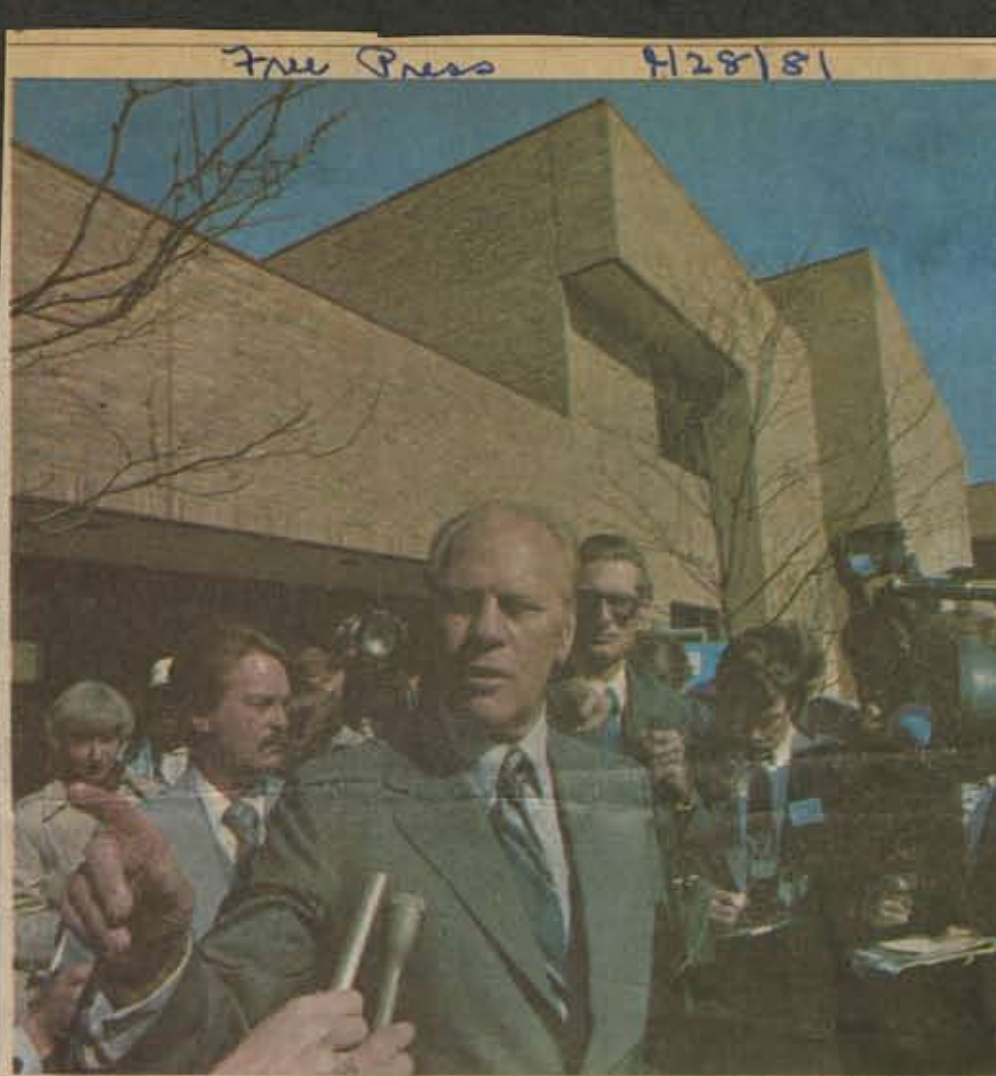

Cronkite acknowledges cheering U-M commencement crowd

U-M grads greet Cronkite with ovation

Walter Cronkite hadn't even risen to speak. More than 4,000 cheering graduates interrupted President Harold Shapiro's introduction of the famous television newsmen at the University of Michigan commencement exercises Saturday.

They stood. They chanted, "Walter, Walter, Walter" over and over. Someone held up a "Cronkite for President" sign.

Cronkite, as anchorman of the CBS Evening News for 19 years, had been a comfortable guest in many of their living rooms.

Now a communications consultant to industry, media critic and CBS special correspondent, Cronkite gave the commencement address and received an honorary doctor of laws degree from the university.

Speaking in his familiar gravelly voice, Cronkite asked the graduates to harness the "technological revolution" to the cause of human liberty.

The world is experiencing a "frustration that comes of having the tools in our hands but not being able to figure out how to use them for the benefit of all mankind," Cronkite said.

Cronkite said pessimists believe

there may be no solving the four "megaproblems" facing the world — the population explosion, pollution, the depletion of natural resources and nuclear proliferation.

"I think that is a proposition that at least you would want to test," he told the graduates.

He urged them to remain true to the principles of the American Revolution — life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. "It is the legacy we owe to freedom, and therein lies the key to leadership."

Cronkite recited a litany of domestic problems facing the graduates: crumbling roads; falling industry; an inadequate welfare system that "does nothing for the spirit"; costly medical care; and "an entire population sinking into solipsism — a philosophy of 'get mine and the devil take the hindmost.'"

He received waves of cheers for attacking the American system of picking a president. "You should ask yourselves whether the talents and qualities that get a man elected have anything to do with those needed to run the country — whether the current process selects the best man for the job."

He said government must be made more responsive, better able to protect health in the wake of new

Party atmosphere brought smiles amid the pomp

Champagne corks popped and bounced off the turf at Michigan Stadium. The graduates of the various schools and colleges of the U-M had come to party.

Shortly after noon, they began filing across

the gridiron and into a seating block along the 50-yard line. The flow of black gowns didn't stop until about 1 p.m.

"Wow!" one young man said, climbing into the bleachers. "These are the best football seats I've ever had."

The graduates wore garlands of flowers around their necks, Detroit Tiger baseball caps in place of traditional mortarboard, or dark

sunglasses. Many carried balloons or cradled bottles of champagne.

Education school graduates had fastened plastic apples to their caps. The School of Natural Resources people favored pine sprigs. One woman had a red stuffed lobster taped to her mortarboard.

Kathleen Nolan, who got her bachelor's in education, sat broiling in her black gown.

"I had to wear nylons and a slip," she said. "It's hot." A magnolia flower wilted in her hair. Nolan, 21, has no job lined up, but she's not worried.

"I'm in no big rush. I can get by for awhile."

Her friend Shawn York was graduating in dentistry. He said he's going to settle in to a general practice in Houghton Lake with an associate.

"I like the idea of being a small-town dentist," he said.

Art Holzknecht, who said his friend Nolan deserves a good job because "she's brilliant," is doing well for himself — he'll soon start at \$27,200 as an electrical engineer for Ford.

"The American auto industry is picking up," he said. "It needs good people."

Joe Gottfried, 22, had shed his graduation clothes entirely. He wore faded jeans and a loud Hawaiian shirt. A gold tassel swung from his ear.

He plans to enter medical school in the fall and wants to find a blonde girlfriend.

"She has to be Romanian," Gottfried said. "They make good stroganoff."

"I'll be rich in 10 years."

Mike Buhler wore a cockeyed painter's cap. He'll take himself and his English degree to an interview next week at a private school in Minnesota, where he hopes to teach.

"I'm ready to sign a contract and read it later," he said.

Somebody far away on the platform was welcoming the graduates to the ranks of "learned men and women." They were cheering.

Buhler pulled out a bottle and swigged warm gin and tonic.

"This is the best graduation," he said. "Outside. It's like Woodstock. You've got the speakers up on scaffolding and kids running around with no shirts. It's a festival atmosphere."

technology, manage resources and streamline the economy.

"Your task will be to make America work again, to overhaul the system, discarding defective or outmoded parts and restoring those that still serve," he said. "You will be rebuilding, even redesigning, America."

A rebuilt America will be a shining example to the rest of the world, Cronkite said. This country should "seek to use our own once universally-admired revolutionary heritage as a guideline to extending a helping hand to the emerging peoples."

"We are going to need converts to the cause of freedom if it is to endure. Freedom must be a growth industry."

Commencement was held in

Michigan Stadium for the first time in 20 years. In May 1964, the last time, President Lyndon B. Johnson gave his "Great Society" address.

Joel Berger, U-M information officer, said the ceremonies were moved outside to allow graduates to invite more guests. Nearly one-third of the 101,000-seat Michigan Stadium was filled.

Although 5,900 U-M students at the Ann Arbor campus were supposed to receive degrees this spring, Berger estimated that only 4,200 to 4,500 participated in the commencement ceremonies. He based the estimate on the number of graduation gowns rented.

Bernard M. W. Knox, a renowned classical scholar, received the afternoon's second honorary degree — doctor of humanities. Knox is director of the Center for

Hellenic Studies in Washington and an expert on Greek tragedies. He was praised for "enlivening the study of antiquity and making it accessible to the general public."

Cronkite recently was ordered by doctors to cut back on his schedule and it was rumored that he might cancel his U-M appearance. He came to Ann Arbor shortly before the address and left soon after.

Marsha Stein, Cronkite's press agent, said he had a bleeding ulcer. Doctors told him to take it easy last week. A Friday appearance to present broadcast awards at the University of Arizona was postponed.

"The man has been on the go constantly all year, traveling around the world on various assignments," said Stein. She said he probably will accept fewer engagements in keeping with the medical advice.

Wouldn't it be g-loverly?

Whatever happened to little white gloves?

Thirty years ago, no lady worthy of the appellation would make a social appearance without hands clothed in white. Shorties or wristbone lengths were *de rigueur* for church, luncheons and tea parties. Longer gloves were acceptable, too, depending on what else you were wearing. The custom went out of style in the 1960s when informality became institutionalized.

Hats were similarly ensconced on the heads of gentlepersons and similarly dismissed when skirts rose and hair was Sassooned.

The late-'60s-style receiving line was hatless and gloveless. Eleanor Wernette, then-president of the U-M Faculty Women's Club, was a firsthand observer of the gloveless, hatless revolution.

"There has been a great change, sort of women's lib in back of it," she says of the great glove overthrow. "Wives, daughters, professors themselves aren't interested in tea parties any more." She notes that Harold and Vivian Shapiro, the present U-M first family, are not fond of the sort of entertaining that requires receiving lines.

"I loved the days of receiving lines," she continues regretfully. "I think nowadays, we're a little too informal, but I see exactly what some people object to . . . still I'd like to see people try receiving lines at least once a year. Don't you think it would be nice to see Harold

Shapiro on the street and be able to say 'That's the president of the university?'"

"Whatever happened to little white gloves and tea hats? Used to be, everybody got a new hat to wear to the opening tea. There was a great hat store at the corner of State and William. Now people don't go out and buy a new hat for anything," she exclaims.

"There were all kinds of ways to use up your old white gloves — house cleaning, hand cream — put it on, then put on the gloves until it soaked in. We never threw them away."

For nostalgia buffs, little white gloves are one of the greatest, most under-appreciated, highly available categories of collectibles. Dozens of pairs are usually in stock at thrift shops and second hand stores, often priced at a dime or a quarter a pair. The variety of styles is amazing.

Fortunately for those whose nail polish is easily chipped, gloves are making a comeback. Pop culture is partly responsible — Michael Jackson's begloved right hand is widely imitated. The revival of preppiness is another cause for rejoicing in the white glove industry. Nancy Reagan hasn't been photographed in *Woman's Wear Daily* wearing little white gloves yet, but it must be just around the corner.

If you yearn to emulate Michael Jackson, several Ann Arbor stores have the goods (or in that case, the good) — a single glove for the right hand, spangled and sparkled. Middle Earth, 1209 South University Ave., has a bejeweled off-white



beauty, \$6.50. At Generations, 337 S. Main St., a model quite close to the original is on markdown at \$3. Jacobson's Miss J accessories department offers a silver glove with silver sequins, \$4.50.

MJ has also spawned some interesting glove-related paraphernalia. White nylon socks with a sprightly glove print in silver ink for moonwalking feet are \$5 in Miss J accessories at Jacobson's. New York kidswear manufacturer Knitwaves offers an acrylic fleece sweatshirt with sunglasses, a spangled glove and "Thriller" lettering in its summer line.

For real little white gloves, check the department stores. Jacobson's has several styles on hand, including some hot white satin elbow dusters for \$21. For a true rush of what was once called femininity, try on the white chiffon shorties with ruffled and ribbon-tied cuffs, \$19 at Jacobson's.

To see what happens when white gloves meet New Wave, visit Collected Works, 325 E. Liberty St. It has white cotton gloves with neon-bright fingerless over-gloves, \$10.

Gloves of every sort are in great demand for fall.

Listening, supporting and handholding become a way of life

troubled times changed student teas

When Sally Fleming first moved into the University of Michigan president's house on South University Avenue, she was unprepared for the mansion's size.

"When we saw this mansion, we thought we had to have roller skates to get around," recalled the wife of former U-M president Robben W. Fleming. "My daughter complained bitterly because we had to telephone her to come to dinner," she recalled Tuesday at a banquet honoring four women who held the title of "First Lady" of U-M.

Zonta International of Ann Arbor, a business and professional women's organization, honored Fleming, Anne Hatcher, Alene Smith, and Vivian Shapiro at the event, held at the Campus Inn. Hatcher was unable to attend because she and her husband, Harlan (president from 1951 to 1967), were out of town.

Robben Fleming was U-M president from

1968 to 1978, an era troubled by campus unrest.

"The young students were very angry and tried to show it to us," Sally Fleming recounted Tuesday. "In our first press conference one boy put his foot on Robben's chair and said: 'You're no good. Why do you want to come here?' This made me feel uncomfortable."

Because of the troubled times, Fleming had to discontinue the student teas initiated by her predecessor Anne Hatcher.

"Students would come in bare dirty feet and scoop off the whole tray of cookies and do anything to embarrass us," Fleming said.

She continued a smaller version of the teas, however, with about 20 students at a time. Besides students, Fleming's entertaining role extended to the entire community.

"We tried to mix disciplines so people who had seen names but didn't know each other were friends by the end of the even-

ing. The role of president's wife is a unifying force for both faculty wives and administration. I tried to make everyone feel welcome and friendly and I guess that was the biggest challenge," said Fleming.

As a testament to her success, the U-M Faculty Women's Club has asked Fleming to become its president. Outside of the University, Fleming supports Planned Parenthood, tutors in the Literary Council and plays in a chamber music ensemble.

From 1978 to 1980, first lady Alene Smith provided an attentive ear for president Allan Smith. "Who's to say I didn't have a part in the more thoughtful decisions?" she said. During that time, she edited her husband's speeches.

"Each first lady has tremendous opportunities to take part in the university. I can say this with less embarrassment than probably Sally Fleming or Vivian Shapiro, because I didn't have a very long time to

house it up or do a terrific job," Smith said with a smile.

Smith gave breakfasts for the regents to help establish a sense of trust and lunches to the editors of the Michigan Daily to open communications between administration and the press.

"If that contributed to a feeling of trust between those who make decisions for the university, then having breakfast ready on the patio porch was my pleasure. These are such little things, but put a 100 little things together and the president's wife can be pretty effective," Smith asserted.

The unpleasant side of the first lady's job is the time and energy it demands.

"I suffered when criticism was leveled at Allan but I also shared in his successes. As I've learned from my short term, being a successful president's wife is an art, a craft and even a trade," Smith said.

Vivian Shapiro, whose husband became president in 1980, has a professional career of her own. She is a clinical social worker in the university's Department of Psychiatry and is part of a multi-discipline organization giving advice to parents about child development.

She is an assistant professor and lecturer in the School of Social Work and a lecturer in the Medical School.

She is on the board of directors for the Hands on Museum, Michigan Bell Telephone, and the Michigan Association of Infant Mental Health and a member of the Downtown Development Authority.

"When one shifts roles from a professor, you have a feeling for the community. When one moves to administration, a gulf develops between you. It's very difficult when our own friends and colleagues wonder if you are the same person you were the day before," Shapiro said.

Adjusting to the president's house was also a bit difficult for Shapiro. "One of the important things of moving into the president's house you must become familiar with the tradition. It took me a year to feel I could move a chair from one side of the room to another without feeling I had to justify it with some person in the past," she said.

Shapiro has served during a period of economic uncertainty for both the university and the state.

"One has to find a way to stay optimistic even in the face of public questioning. The University of Michigan is a very professional university. Answers come from within the university community. In that sense, I did not view my role as offering solutions because I think those solutions come from within the University's departments. One does a great deal of listening, supporting and handholding," Shapiro explained.

The president's role affected her family life, and forced her to pull back from her professional life temporarily.

"Private time is extended to a difference sense of family — a University of Michigan community family. The transition was difficult for the children because they found it hard to have 35,000 siblings," she said.

Fleming and Smith provided important role models for Shapiro. They taught her inner strength, belief in strong values, commitment and understanding," Shapiro said.

But the job of first lady has its pleasures. "In general, I have found a deep satisfaction in the constantly changing role and the unclear role of the president's wife," Shapiro closed.

Proceeds from Tuesday's banquet will help fund Zonta projects such as Safe House, providing clean well water to people in Sri Lanka and aiding the center for Continuing Education for Women. Zonta provides scholarships for women in science and a scholarship fund honoring Marie Hartwig, a professor of physical education.

In honor of the first ladies, Zonta President Letitia Byrd announced the establishment of a scholarship for women in communications and asked for community support.

Michigan Daily 'U' first ladies discuss their roles in their roles on campus

The wife of the University president must be a "unifying force for faculty wives," former University first lady Sally Fleming told a women's group at the Campus Inn Tuesday night. "I tried to keep them happy, which helped to keep the professors happy," she said at a banquet held to honor the University's past and present first ladies.

Joining Fleming were Aileen Smith, whose husband Allan led the University from 1978 to 1980, and Vivian Shapiro, wife of current president Harold Shapiro.

FLEMING reminisced about the size of the president's house on East University. "We thought we needed roller skates to get from one end to another," she said. "My daughter thought we should telephone her at the third floor to come down to dinner."

Fleming, whose husband Robben was at the University's helm from 1968 to 1978, said a large part of the first lady's job is to entertain at the president's house. She said she often invited guests and students — including the Daily staff — to informal evenings by the fireside.

Recalling her term as first lady, Smith said the University regents complained about never having informal gatherings to get to know each other. She said she remedied this by inviting them to breakfast on the patio.

"The rule was no business, no speeches, and no publicity meetings," Smith said.

Current first lady Vivian Shapiro, herself a professor in social work, noted the difficulties of moving into administration. "When one moves to administration," she said, "a gulf develops between you (and the faculty). It's very difficult when your own friends and colleagues wonder if you are the same person you were the day before," she said.

The dinner was sponsored by Zonta, a women's public service organization. Club president Letitia Byrd announced the group's newest project — a scholarship in honor of the first ladies for female communication students which will "support the right of women to a voice in society."

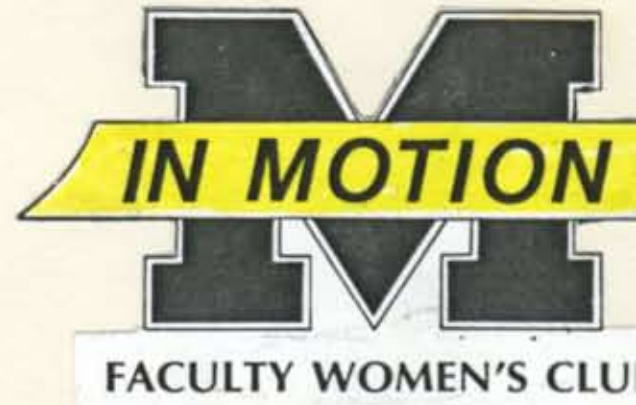
