
The October Board Meeting will be held at the home of Joan Stouffer, 106 N. Glendale, on October 4, at 8:00.

MICHIGAN DAMES CHAPTER HISTORY



The national Association of University Dames was officially organized in the school years of 1920-21 by two of its chapters, Chicago and Iowa. The University of Michigan was among a group of the first chapter in 1921 to receive their charters and become active members of NAUD. And, as of 1967, there are ninety-two chapter of University Dames throughout the

United States -- any of which you, as a member of Dames, are entitled to join. "Once a Dame, always a Dame" is our favorite slogan.

Your membership also entitles you to attend the regular monthly general meetings, held the second Wednesday of each month during the academic year, and any or all of the Interest Group meetings held each month.

The purpose of this organization is to provide social and educational advantages for the wives of students and interns, and for student wives. You are invited to participate actively and make new friends. Any Dame whose membership has expired or any mother of a student may become an associate member upon payment of dues.


The emblem of the University Dames is the wedding ring pierced by an arrow. The ring has been used as a bond of fidelity since earliest history. The form of the ring, being circular, signifies ethernal and unchanging affection. The arrow is used as a symbol of outgoing generosity and friendship.

The colors of the Michigan Chapter of University Dames are maize and blue, the same as those used by the University of Michigan.


