She demonstrated ways to warm-up and warm-down, and how to prevent overuse of our voices. We are now set with the dos and don'ts of singing!

After all of the singing and learning we took a break to begin the games. All of the voice sections (SI, SII, AI, AII) faced off to come up with the best section cheer. Section pride was evident as the different sections performed for us. The night ended engergetically with the favorite game of WGC: blind partner dodge ball (one person leading and the other person with a blindfold)!

Retreat is always a great time to get to know each other and continue to work on our literature for our fall concert as well as Michigan Blues music. This year was no exception!
